- Provide food for native moths, caterpillars, and butterflies




Ruth Bader Ginsburg



- Second female Supreme Court Justice (1993-2020)
- Fought for women's equality in the courts both as a lawyer and a justice
- First director of the American Civil Liberties Union's (ACLU) Women's Rights Project

Zitkála-Ša ("Red Bird")



- Tribal member of the Yankton Dakota Sioux in South Dakota
- Advocate for Native American and women's suffrage
- Shared her Sioux culture through music and writing
- Co-founded the National Council of American Indians

What is Women's Suffrage?

Earlier in American history, many people thought that women should not participate in politics. Women were denied the right to vote in elections and treated unequally by men. Suffrage means the right to vote, and suffragists believed that women should be able to vote.

Suffragists like Zitkála-Ša, Alice Thornton Jenkins, and Anna Kelton Wiley fought and protested for many years. They never gave up, even when members of their groups were sent to jail or injured.

What did Suffragists do?

Suffragists needed to convince people that women should be able to vote. These are some ways they fought for their beliefs:



The hard work of suffragists led to the creation of the 19th amendment which gave women the right to vote. **Seraph Young** Ford was the first American woman to vote.




Suffragists used signs and banners to share what they believed in or what they thought was unfair.

- Electrical engineer
- 2nd American woman in space
- NASA missions: 1984 & 1986



Dr. Kalpana Chawla

- Aerospace engineer
- 1st Indian-American woman in space
- NASA missions: 1997 & 2003



Christa McAuliffe

- High school science teacher
- NASA mission: 1986



Capt. Laurel Clark

- Served as an undersea medical officer (doctor) in the Navy
- NASA mission: 2003

Vinnie Ream Hoxie




- Important sculptor who lived during the Civil War era
- First woman selected by Congress to create a memorial sculpture
- Created a statue of President Abraham Lincoln that stands in the U.S. Capitol

Helen Hamilton Gardener



- Women's rights activist and thinker who wrote and spoke about women's independence
- Fought for women to be treated equally by the scientific world
- Served as one of the only high-level female government employees during her time
- Donated her brain for scientific study after her death

1913 Women's Suffrage Parade

Helen Hamilton Gardener helped organize the famous 1913 Women's Suffrage Parade that thousands of women marched in to raise support for women's rights issues.



Sojourner Truth



- Activist who fought to end slavery and improve women's rights
- Spread messages about equality and religion as a powerful speaker and preacher
- She is not buried at Arlington Cemetary, but she worked there in 1864 to help African Americans who lived in the Freedman's Village

The Freedman's Village

The Freedman's Village was a community for previously enslaved African Americans where they could live, learn skills, and find work. The Village existed on this land before the cemetery was created. Sojourner Truth lived in Freedman's Village for a year to help the residents learn important life skills.



Mary Baird Bryan




- Wife of William Jennings
 Bryan who was an important politician and lawyer
- Worked for women's suffrage and prohibition as a speaker and leader
- Used her own writing, law education and skills to support her husband



- It was used by Nazi Germany to encode secret military messages during World War II
- Teams of American, British, French, and Polish mathematicians and codebreakers worked together to break the Enigma code




