Women have served in and supported the military since the Civil War in many different jobs. Over time, more and more jobs have become open to women. Jobs like:




















Fighter Pilot

Mother of the Unknown Soldier Tree

- First memorial tree at ANC
- Memorial trees are trees that are dedicated to people, wars, and historical events
- This tree honors Gold Star Mothers (the mothers of those who died while serving in the military)
- ANC has over 140 memorial trees

Nurses Section

- Section 21 honors nurses who served in the military
- Women have always served as nurses during wars
- However, the military did not officially hire female nurses until 1898 during the Spanish-American War
- Today, over 30,000 nurses serve in the armed forces

Spanish-American War nurses worked long, difficult days.



Morning

"We worked from 5:00 – 8:00 AM without food of any kind."



Breakfast

"When we went to breakfast, we would get black coffee and some kind of mush."



Work

"Then back to work until 8:00 PM [with only one 20-minute lunch break]."

Their duties included:

- giving ice baths
- dressing wounds
- preparing food and feeding soldiers
- administering medicine

"I remember one dinner there was nothing but boiled cabbage and black coffee."




- Served as a surgeon in World War I
- Created the first modern medical emergency room in a government department
- Helped convince Congress to pass a law that let women receive the same benefits as male doctors

- Served in the Navy during WWI as a Yeoman (F)
- The F stood for Female
- Wanted to serve to make a difference
- Removed from military service after the war ended, along with all women

Meet the WWI Yeomen (F)

- Yeoman is a military rank
 - o Other military ranks are lieutenant, captain, general
- Yeomen (F) many different jobs, including:
 - o Secretary
 - o Translator
 - o Fingerprint Analysis
 - o Recruiter
- Yeomen (F) allowed men to leave their desk jobs to serve overseas in combat






Emma Vogel

- Physical therapist, then called a "reconstruction aide" because they helped "reconstruct" the human body
- Vogel joined the military during WWI
- She helped men who were wounded in combat regain movement through exercises

Lillian Harris



- Graduate of the first Women's Army Corps (WAC) class in 1942
- Served as an officer in World War II and helped manage Germany's surrender in Italy
- Served in Tokyo, Japan during the Korean War
- One of the first female logistics officers: Logistics officers make sure people and things get where they need to go

Look & Find: Sorting Mail in WWII

The 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion was the only unit of African American women who served in Europe during World War II.

The 6888 organized mail for soldiers from their families back home. Their work was important because letters and presents helped the soldiers stay positive and fight for their country.

Mary Crawford Ragland

- Served in the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion, a WAC (Women's Army Corps) unit
- Quickly processed a large amount of mail piled up in Britain and France
- Helped to increase the morale of the troops by giving them the ability to hear from loved ones back at home

Elaine Danforth Harmon



- Served as a WASP (Women Air Service Pilot) during World War II
- Studied complex math, weather patterns, and Morse code
- Flew planes in non-combat missions (testing plane capabilities, transporting planes, and training male pilots)
- Advocated for WASPs to be seen as veterans like male service members were — finally succeeded in 1977


Catherine G. Murray



- Enlisted in the Marines during World War II
- Checked that vehicles were up to date and safe to use
- Wrote manuals to help train future female marines
- Retired after serving 20 years
- Achieved the rank of a Master Sergeant

Arlington Farms

- World War II created many government jobs in Washington,
 D.C. to support the war effort
- Young women, called "government girls," filled these jobs
- Many worked as typists and policy researchers
- The government created Arlington Farms to house them
- Navy WAVES (Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service) also lived at Arlington Farms

Daily Life at Arlington Farms

- They often worked 6 days a week, 8-10 hours a day
- They spent their free time:
 - o Attending dances
 - o Hosting athletic competitions
 - Writing a community newsletter
 - o Socializing with each other
 - o Taking college classes

The Queen of Coding: Grace Hopper

- Math professor and one of the first computer programmers ever
- Helped the Navy create a machine that solved very big math problems automatically
- The technology she created helped the Navy create weapons and defense systems
- Inspired women and girls to learn about coding







- First Army nurse to be killed in combat since the Vietnam War

Military Women's Memorial (MWM)


- The MWM honors and tells the stories of U.S. military women, from the Revolutionary War to the present
